OBJECTIVES: English 12 AP: Literature and Composition models a college level Freshman English Literature class and adheres to the guidelines established by the AP College Board. These guidelines are in line with the revised AP Course Requirements (see http://apcentral.collegeboard.com/apc/Controller.jpf). This class focuses on British literature, the influence of culture and religion upon it, and how literature builds upon itself.

Many colleges offer credit at their institution only when a student has completed an AP course and earned a score of 3 or better on the AP exam. Students taking AP English 12: English Literature and Composition are expected to take the corresponding AP exam in the Spring.
